#### In Your Orchid House

The talk from Tony & Liz on Monday night should have reminded Members that we need to be vigilant with pest invasions within our orchid collections. This weather with the hot days, followed by rain and the humidity provides a great environment for pests to increase in number. For those that were not at our last meeting, here are a couple of photos of crown rot in sarcs and root rot in cymbids.

While the talk concentrated on those two issues, other things happen that we can mistake as normal. It is not unusual to see yellow leaves on our plants and these can be part of the normal growth cycle, however if you see yellowing on the younger leaves there may be a problem. This might include not enough light or fertilizer. Burn marks on leaves indicate too much light or on hot days not enough protection. If the leaves are droopy, soft, puckered and pleated, the plants are not getting enough water.

# 2. TREASURER'S REPORT:

- Treasurer Leanda presented:- both the December and January statements were provided. Opening balance 30/11/2018 was \$26,586.85. Income for December was \$1,396.03 and expenditure \$1,304.20. No unpresented cheques. Closing balance \$26,730.68. There were no comments or questions
- Moved: Leanda O'Connor Seconded: Ken Covington Carried
- The January statement was discussed. Income \$1,561.57; expenditure \$428.30. Unpresented cheques to the value of \$279.95 (BBQ supplies). Closing balance after cheques cleared \$27,574.00.
- The treasurer had recorded the monies received at the BBQ on 28/01/19

and had subtracted the monies spent on stock. Tony Groube questioned this as the amounts indicated was not reflective in the December & January statements. After some discussion between Tony, Anne-Marie and Margaret, Tony put the motion that:

The financial reports as presented be held over until the next meeting. In the meantime, these 3 members will meet with Tony to establish a better way of reporting BBQ expenditure and income.

- Leanda requested permission to pay outstanding accounts.

# 3. Guest Speakers:

Tony & Liz spoke about and showed a number of slides relating to "crown rot". They explained how they had identified it in both sarcs and cymbids and how they had treated those plants. Hopefully, they will be able to save some of them. In the sarcs, the leaves suddenly develop brown spots and then they yellow rapidly. Use these signs as a way of identifying this. The slides indicated how the spots and decolouration started at the top of the leaves and went down into the roots. This problem is likely to develop in the cooler weather when plants remain wet from rain, humidity and lack of airflow. Plants were taken out of pots, bathed in mancozeb, allowed to dry out and then repotted in fresh pot and bark. Be careful not to over water once repotted and ensure good airflow

With the cymbids, the yellowing leaves indicate bulb rot. Take plants out of pot, remove back bulbs and par root ball back until solid roots are found. These are then covered in Sulphur and antirot. They are then allowed to dry out before being repotted.

Liz then demonstrated the use of community pots. The size of the pot as well as the plant dictate the number of plants put into each pot. (see photos later in newsletter)

# 4. GENERAL BUSINESS:

- a. Next General Meeting: Speaker Kylie Stocks speaking on fern propagation. Also will be finalizing preparation for Workshop later in the month.
- b. Anne-Marie explained that she would like members to give a short talk about how they started growing orchids. Margaret & Ken have volunteered for tonight. Margaret will start & Ken will finish.

Margaret: lived in Singapore in the midlate 70's and was a frequent visitor to the orchid houses in the Botanical gardens. The more she saw the more she loved them. On returning from Singapore purchased some cymbids about a dozen. These travelled with her for the next 20 odd years – losing some and others added. On moving to the Bay in 2011, she was interested to hear that there was a club here. While attending a concert in the Soldiers Club, she met Paula & Michael Brown who invited her along to a meeting. Her brother built her a shade house (6m x 3m), which Robert & Sue Fish helped to

put the roof and the shade cloth on. On moving the orchid collection at that time, there was heaps of room. Rob made the comment that it would not take long to fill it. Margaret now has about 400 orchids in it – lots of small pots and the cymbids have been moved to the eastern side of the house, which enables all the other genera to be in the shade house.

- **c.** Presentation of benching award plants to Barry Andrews.
- d. Discussion regarding charitable donation for this financial year. Members were asked about organisations who we might consider donating to. The list given were: Muddy Puddles; Rural Fire Service; Yumaro and Sailability. (see end of newsletter for what each of these Members represent). were reminded that BBOFS had donated profits from Bunnings BBQ's to the Moruya Hospital and BB Hospital two years previously. It was suggested that we look at doing that again. Tony made the comment that more funds should qo back to Members; however he did not explain what he meant.
- e. Anne-Marie asked if the Novices would be interested in having a get together with a more experienced grower prior to each meeting. There did not appear to be much response from the Novices present. Brian Coulton suggested that new Members could have a mentor (a more experienced grower) for the first twelve months of their membership. Obviously, the

more experienced growers would need to be prepared to do this. The idea to be included in newsletter with a request that novice growers respond.

- f. Anne-Marie told Members that they would have seen in the newsletter that each Committee Member had been allocated a role. The library was the only role not filled. She explained that the Committee felt it should be given to a different member at each meeting. Lin made the comment that apart from herself; very few items had been borrowed over the past 12 months. Una offered to look after the library. Thank you Una.
- g. The Members present were informed that Robert & Sue Fish had resigned from the Committee for family reasons. The Committee had discussed this in relation to numbers and had decided that the current number was sufficient. The Membership were told that if someone had a burning desire to be part of the Committee his or her nomination would be accepted. Una nominated and was accepted.
- March Interclub Workshop: accommodation has been booked. Stephen Monkhouse and Jeanne Dunn are bringing flasks. Numbers are growing. Hopefully we will see more BBOFS Members registering soon.
- i. The Growing Experience plant for 2019 is a Sarc from Riverview Nursery (John Stubbs). They are

available for collection after the meeting. One plant per membership number. Please write name on sheet provided.

j. Getting into Orchids - Ken: obtained his first cymbids at about 12 years. Kept it for a few years, however due to family and work there was a hiatus of about 55 vears apart from an occasional basket of dendrobiums. When he moved to the Bay, the owners of the house he bought left him about 6 or 7 orchids. Since then he has slowly got back into growing them and has expanded his knowledge of them. A work in progress.
