# In Your Orchid House

It seems like the last of the summer/autumn temperatures have left us, but that hasn't stopped the rain. My recordings of our rain fall have told me that we have received 878mls of rain in the first 4 months of the year. That is not much short of our annual rainfall of 900ml.

All that rain and the humidity that goes with it indicates that we will have a few "nasties" out and about with our plants. Therefore, regularly checking plants can save new growths and flower spikes from being damaged by these pests. Going out at night with a torch will help you find them as well. Lots of genre are now producing new growths, so make sure they are still receiving the water and nutrients they need. This will ensure good stock for flowering in the next 12 months. Enough light and air flow are also important during this wetter period, as it reduces the risk of some pests and it also promotes good flower growth.

As always, repotting can be carried out at any time, so ensuring that you have sufficient pots, bark and/or fertilizer available is good practice.

3. Anne-Marie explained that Jane Wright, our planned guest speaker had notified her late last week that she would be unable to attend the meeting. Anne-Marie had contact Lynne and Brian Phelan to ask if they could come today, which they have done. Anne-Marie thanked them for making the trip and introduced Lynne who is doing the presentation on Mexican Laelias.

Lynne explained that these plants were first named in 1831 and that there are two main types. One grows in the highlands (above 2000m) and the other grows in the lowlands of Mexico. The general characteristics of these plants are: mostly epiphytic; sympodial; mostly cold tolerant most grow at altitude up to 2500m except two (2) lowland species; they need lots of light and good air movement; they flower mostly in autumn and growing summer and early season is autumn.

The main variety of the highlands are: Laelia albida which is very widespread. It is a scented, compact plant that has upright racemes that have multiple flowers. The other is Laelia anceps which will grow on just about anything it can hold onto bricks, walls, trees or in baskets or pots in the garden. There are multiple varieties of anceps. Lynne spoke about some of the different varieties of anceps and their different growth and inflorescences habits from very large to more compact growths and racemes. The areas that they are found in also varies from higher elevations to the lower areas in the highlands. Some of the anceps will not grow in pots. Lynne gave us this summary of anceps culture which is: well drained potting medium, plenty of water and fertilizer in the growing season (summer and autumn), bright light, good air circulation, high humidity an asset but not essential, rest period after flowering and repot/divide when roots start to grow on new leads.

There are two lowland types which are: Laelia aurea and Laelia rubescens. These are found on the Pacific rim at 100 – 1700m. It is suspected that aurea is the yellow form of rubescens. Neither are cold tolerant and have a distinctive dark maroon spot on the throat of the lip.

Lynne also informed us that "Old Man's Beard" can choke what it is growing on especially on or around pots.

Anne-Marie thanked Lynne for her interesting presentation and for bringing some of her plants to demonstrate these plants. Lynne also brought several plants which were for sale.
