In Your Orchid House

The weather has certainly been helpful for this year's growing season, with the mix of rain, warm days and comfortable nights. Sometimes we could wish the rain further, but our orchids certainly like to be watered by the rain.

However, the warmth and the rain bring on the pests and the bugs, so we need to remain vigilant. Keeping our orchid houses as weed free as possible reduces the likelihood of pest infestation.

Fertilising with a weaker solution more frequently is what is usually recommended during the growing season.

Spikes and flowers are appearing on different genre now and the variety of plants benched at our February meeting indicates the diversity of plants grown by our members.

The warmth and rain will also be having an effect on the mix in the pots, so keep an eye on it to ensure that it is doing its best to support the plants, particularly allowing water to drain freely. Air movement is also an important part of plant growth, so ensure that air can circulate around all your pots by not having them too close together on the benches.

4. Guest Speaker: Dylan Morrissey

As Dylan is a new member, he introduced himself and gave us a potted history of his orchid growing, which started very early in his life.

His topic was "Twig Epiphytes of Tropical Americas - Caribbean Basin. Dylan had lots of slides to go with this presentation as well as having some of the plants. He also put a couple of plants on the raffle table. Thank you Dylan.

This group are small plants with big colourful flowers and tiny seeds. There are lots of adaptions as to where they will grow. This is because the seeds are so tiny that they fly around and stick to damp surfaces, usually at the beginning of the wet season. The flowers are pollinated by moths, butterflies and or humming birds. As the plants are small, they send out runners which makes them into clumping plants.

There are lots of hybrids which are also very colourful. Hugh variations can be found from the same cross.

Plants in this genre include:- Tillandsia (air plant) which are mostly silver and use their roots to anchor them. There are 24 species which are found from 0 - 1000m in sub-tropical areas.

Old Man's Beard - which is also very diverse with 22 different varieties.

How to grow these plants:- Don't water in winter as this will kill them. They must have dry feet overnight. If temperature will be up to 20 degrees - water in the morning; if over 28 degrees mist again in the afternoon.

Pot in small pebbles or in/on cork. Use fertilizer in a very weak solution. Don't disturb the roots when potting up, maximum however the size pot required should not be any larger than 4 inches.
