#### In your Orchid House

I wish this weather would decide if it is still winter or if spring really is just around the corner. We have several really nice days and then it turns cold again. It would be nice if the warm days continued so that all those plants with the spikes on could get a nice boost and the flowers open.

However, this weather means that we must be more alert for the usual collections of pests that love to destroy all the good work we do with our plants.

Our plants that have been resting over the colder winter months are starting to become active again, so make sure you are feeding and watering them.

Some genre will be finishing their flowering, so keep an eye on them to see if they need anything in particular doing to them apart from removing the dead spikes.

Of course we are in the middle of the show season, so keeping those flowering plants in show condition to be able to display them at their best is the reason we grow them.



#### 2. TREASURER'S REPORT:

Treasurer Leanda presented:-Opening balance \$8559.69. Income a lot of which related to Winter Show was \$1628.50. Expenditure was \$1561.50 which also Winter the Show. One related to amount unpresented cheque. Fiscal \$29,105.09

Leanda requested permission to pay outstanding accounts.

Leanda then presented the reconciliation for the Winter Show. Income totalled \$1589.50 and expenses totalled \$1211.28 which means that we made a small profit of \$378.22 on the Show.

#### 3. GENERAL BUSINESS:

- a. Next General Meeting; Speaker is Jean Swindley topic TBC
- b. Result of Winter Show. The committee felt that the show went very well. There were over 400 people thru' the door. Plants on our sales table and that of the 3 vendors all sold very well. Robert did a great job on the potting

demonstrations and one person even came back the next day for more information. The posy making on Sunday on the floor was very popular and will be repeated at the Spring Show. Anne-Marie thanked Dylan for his role as Assistance Show Marshall and for the expert assistance and advice he gave while helping on the sales table. Anne-Marie also commented that it was great to see 5 members participating in the Floral Art section of the show. Anne-Marie thanked all those who had assisted during the show.

- c. Next meeting is after the Spring Show – will try the floral art demonstration during the show, otherwise continue as usual.
- **d.** Judges for Spring Show Graham Gray & Hardy Beilharz
- e. Alternate way of counting benching results it was discussed at a committee meeting then at the last general meeting that we trial a different way of voting for our plants at meetings. This process will be trialled at the September meeting.
- f. 2023 dates for shows: the 1<sup>st</sup> July is a Saturday. Is that counted as 1<sup>st</sup> weekend in July? If so, that would make BBOFS Winter show dates the 14<sup>th</sup> set up and open 15<sup>th</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup> July. This was agreed to.
- g. Anne-Marie has been in contact with Suze, the Bunnings Activity Organiser who has asked us to participate in a Floral Art activity demonstrating posy making at Bunnings. Date is 13<sup>th</sup> August 1-3pm.
- h. December is not far away and we need to start thinking about the Christmas party. Any suggestions as to where and when we might hold it gratefully accepted.

**4. Guest Speaker:** Kylie Stocks from Verdigris Fern Nursery speaking about Fern Allies

Kylie explained that she is a Botanist by profession. She and her husband run the nursery together. They have both a practical and academic interest in ferns and both like different types of ferns. They do a lot of their own propagation.

Fern Allies are a diverse group of plants that are neither ferns or angiosperms. The best known of this group that are cultivated are the tassel ferns and selaginellas. However, they are similar to ferns in that they have a similar life cycle. They reproduce via spores and their primary organism is a sporophyte. Kylie showed us a slide that explained how they all fitted together.

Kylie explained that there are two types of fern allies - club mosses and horsetails. Kylie then went onto explain how to identify the different types of club mosses by their habit and cultivation. The two main types of these are Lycopodium and selaginellas. These two have different growth habits. The lycopodium is very difficult to cultivate and therefore is not commercially viable. The selaginellas can be found in a variety of colours and forms and may be known as the resurrection fern because of its ability to become dormant until conditions are right for it to grow. Kylie had slides that showed these two types differences between them.

The other allies – the Horsetail is considered a noxious weed in Australia, therefore Kylie did not have a piece to show us what it looks like, however the slides told the story.

Tassel ferns belong to the Fir Moss family. Once again Kylie explained their identification, cultivation and care. There are more than 200 species world wide of which 12 are found in Australia. They are mostly epiphytic but some are lithophytes. They are called tassel ferns as they sometimes have a small tassel like

appendage at the end of the fronds. These plants are very slow growing and therefore tend to be expensive. This group of ferns are very particular about how they are cared for. They don't like to be over watered which can cause root rot from which they cannot be revived. They are heavy feeders, so lots of fertilizer is required. Spin your pot around so the growth is even in the pot. The fronds can be brittle so handle them carefully. They are fairly resistant to diseases and pests however if seen, you need to be very careful with the chemicals chosen to manage these.

Anne-Marie thanked Kylie for her interesting presentation. Some of the plants Kylie used in her presentation were for sale so members purchased them.
